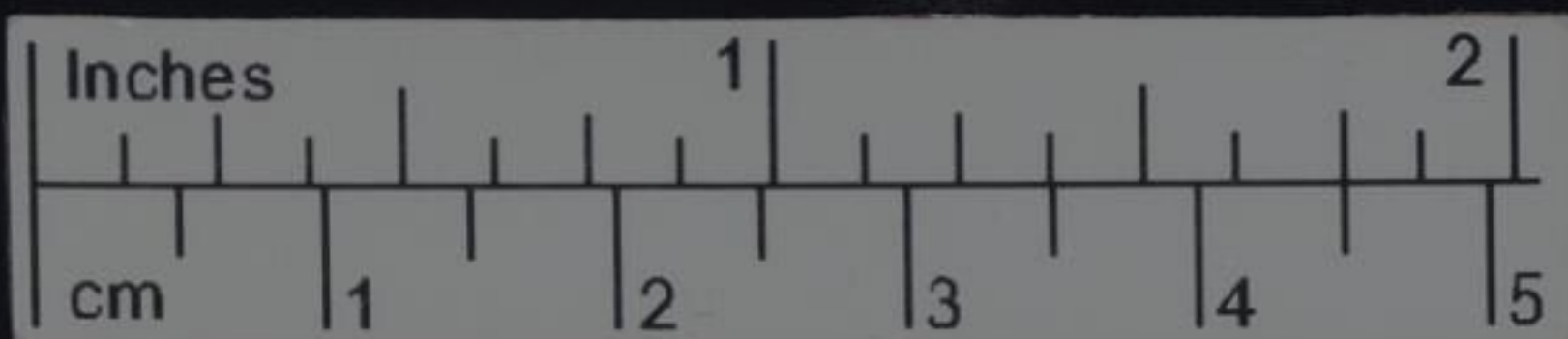

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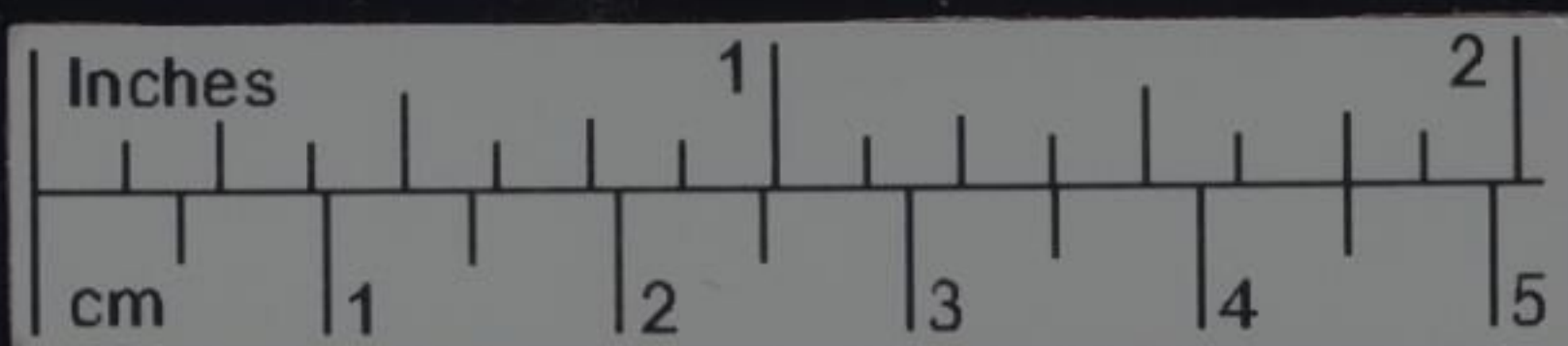

Greatest Eclipse..... 3 44 —

Ends 4 4 —

Magnitude of the Eclipse (Sun's diameter being 1) 0.05 on the southern limb.

Sept. 7, An annular eclipse of the SUN, *invisible* at Greenwich.

Begins on the Earth generally.. 7^h 24^m evening.

Central and annular eclipse 10 14 —

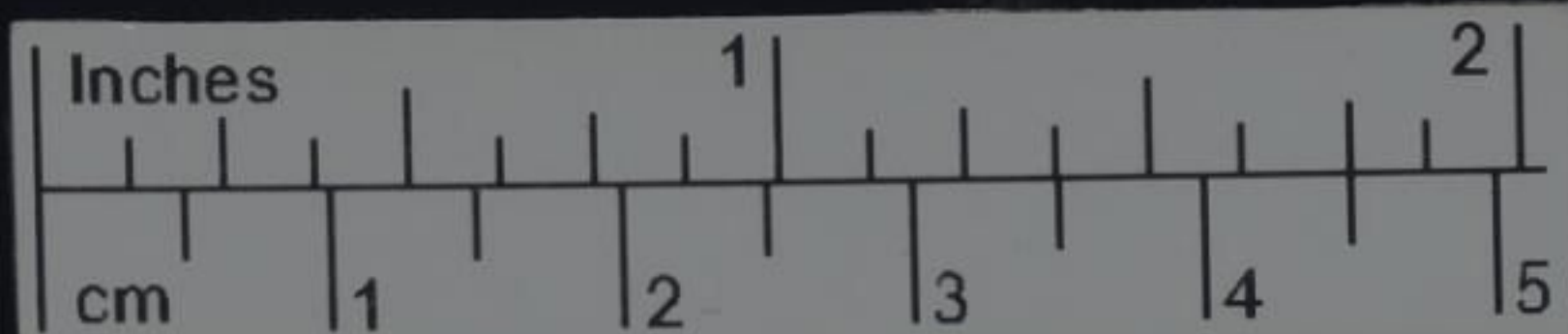
Ends on the earth generally.... 1 21 morning.

Jupiter will be a morning star till April 4, then an evening star till Oct. 18, and then a morning star to the end of the year. The Satellites will not be visible from September 27 to November 17, Jupiter being too near the Sun.

Venus will be an evening star till October 1, then a morning star till the end of the year.

General Post Office.

The Principal Office is in St. Martin's-le-Grand. There are Branch Offices at Charing-cross, Vere-street, Southwark, and in Lombard-street, at each of which notice is given of the arrival of foreign mails, &c. The Branch Offices are open for the receipt of letters until a quarter before seven P.M., and in Lombard-street till seven; after which hour no letters are received except at St. Martin's-le-grand, where they are received till half-past seven, on paying 6*d.* each.

On foreign post nights, *viz.* Tuesday and Friday, foreign letters are received at Charing-cross, Vere-street, and Southwark till 8 P.M., and at Lombard-st. till 11.

Packets of one ounce weight are charged as four single letters.—If a single sheet exceed one ounce, it is charged according to its weight.

Packets or covers, containing patterns or samples only not exceeding one ounce, are charged double postage.

Newspapers, to go the same day, must be put into the General Post Office before six o'clock; but those put in before half-past seven o'clock will go the same evening by paying a halfpenny each. In the Branch Offices they must be put in before five.

Newspapers to or from France, Hamburg, Bremen, Denmark, Greece, Corfu and Ionian Islands, Columbia, Buenos Ayres, Caraccas, Carthagen, Bogota, and Hayti or St. Domingo are free of postage; but to or from other foreign countries they pay 2*d.* each.

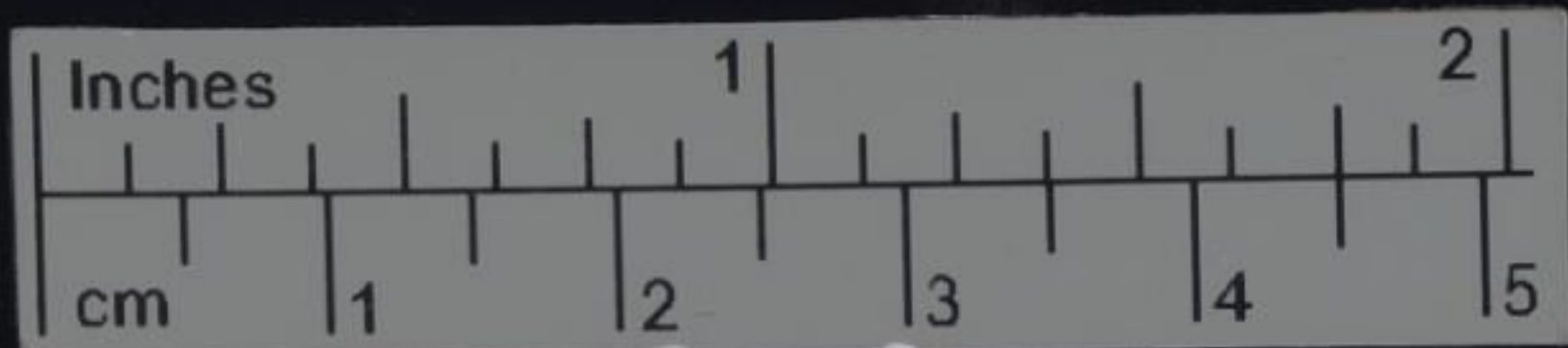
The weight of a letter franked by a Member of Parliament must not exceed one ounce. Each member may frank ten and receive fifteen daily.

The mail for France is made up daily, except Sundays.

Twopenny Post Office.

The Principal Office is at the General Post Office, St. Martin's-le-Grand.

Letters going from one part of the Town to another.—If put into the Receiving Houses by 8, 10, and 12 o'clock in the morning, and by 2, 4, 6, and 8 o'clock in the afternoon, or in either of the two principal offices by 9 and 11 in the morning, and by 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, in the afternoon; they are sent out for delivery at 10 and 12 in the morning; and 2, 4, 6, 8, in the afternoon, and 8 the next morning. No letter must weigh more than four ounces.

If the sum lent be under 5s. the ticket is gratis; 5s. and under 10s., ½d.; 10s. under 1l., 1d.; 1l. under 5l., 2d; 5l. upwards, 4d.

If any person entitled to redeem goods shall, before the end of the year from the time of pawning give notice in writing not to sell such goods till three calendar months from the end of such year, the pawnbroker must not sell them during such time.

Quarter Sessions.

By the stat. 1 Wm. IV. c.70, the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace for every county, riding, or division, are to be held the first week after the 31st March, 24th June, 11th October, and 28th December.

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
